# Re-evaluating the Role of Teaching Learning Materials in the Education of Students with Intellectual Disability

Teaching Learning Materials (TLMs) are integral to facilitating meaningful education for students with intellectual disability (ID). These materials bridge the gap between abstract concepts and concrete understanding, helping learners with ID engage with content in ways that are accessible, adaptive, and effective. Despite their recognized importance, the actual utilization and appropriateness of TLMs in classroom settings remain areas of concern. My doctoral research set out to examine the multifaceted role of TLMs in the education of students with intellectual disability, focusing on their utilization, appropriateness, the application of technology-based materials, and the challenges teachers face in their implementation. Aim and Scope of the Study The primary aim of the study was to critically examine how TLMs are employed in educational settings providing to students with intellectual disability. The study sought to:

- Investigate the extent to which TLMs are utilized.
- Assess the appropriateness of these materials for the learners' in six domains.
- Explore the use of technology-based TLMs.
- Identify the difficulties educators face in selecting, designing, and using TLMs effectively. The study was conducted with a strong sample of 413 special educators working across both special schools and inclusive school settings. Their experiences, insights, and practices provided a rich dataset for understanding the real-world application of TLMs in diverse educational environments. Key Findings The findings from the study were both revealing and concerning. Despite the theoretical emphasis on the importance of TLMs, their practical implementation remains limited and inconsistent.
- 1. Utilization of TLMs: Educators were found to utilize teaching learning materials at a low to moderate rate. While TLMs are acknowledged as helpful, their actual use in daily classroom activities was inconsistent, suggesting gaps in planning, availability, or confidence in using them.
- 2. Appropriateness of TLMs: A significant 75% of teachers scored low on the scale of appropriateness, indicating that most materials being used do not fully align with the learning needs, abilities, or developmental stages of students with intellectual disabilities. This points to a mismatch between the materials provided and the specific requirements of learners.
- 3. Technology-Based TLMs: The integration of technology in TLMs was found to be notably low. Despite the growing availability of digital tools, apps, and assistive technologies, most educators were not using them effectively, if at all. The reasons varied from lack of access and training to discomfort with digital platforms.
- 4. Teacher Difficulties: Educators reported a high level of difficulty in using TLMs. These


challenges stemmed from insufficient training, lack of institutional support, inadequate resources, and time constraints in preparing or customizing materials. Implications and Recommendations The findings suggest a felt need for a comprehensive re-evaluation of current practices surrounding TLMs in the education of students with intellectual disability. Addressing these issues requires a multi-disciplinary approach:

- Professional Development: Regular, handson training for teachers on how to design, adapt, and effectively use TLMs, including digital tools, is essential. This training should be embedded in both pre-service and in-service teacher education.
- Curriculum Integration: The development of curriculum frameworks must include clear guidelines on the use of appropriate and differentiated TLMs, with suggestions for low-cost and easily accessible materials.
- Institutional Support: Schools must be equipped with adequate resources both physical and digital and provide teachers

- with dedicated time and space for preparing materials.
- Research and Innovation: Continued research into the development of culturally relevant, learner-centered, and technologically enhanced TLMs will help build a more inclusive and effective educational landscape.

#### Conclusion

Teaching Learning Materials hold transformative potential in the education of students with intellectual disability. However, their underutilization, low appropriateness, limited use of technology, and the significant difficulties faced by educators call for immediate attention. It is imperative that stakeholders, educators, policymakers, curriculum designers, and researchers come together to redesign the approach to TLMs, ensuring that they truly serve the purpose of enabling every learner to learn, thrive, and succeed.
